WORLD WATCH LIST:

Open Doors have asked for prayer for the persecuted church each week, based on their world watch list, taking one country each week. https://www.opendoorsuk.org/persecution/world-watch-list/ Pakistan is in fifth place on the list. There are around 4 Million believers in Pakistan who face extreme persecution in every area of their lives. Believers, who have converted from Islam, face the greatest levels of persecution, but all Christians are considered second-class citizens in this strongly Islamic country. Christians, particularly Christian men, are given jobs perceived as low, dirty and dishonourable, and can be victims of bonded labour. There are some Christians among the middle classes, but they are still considered inferior to their Muslim counterparts and often face severe workplace discrimination. Christian girls are at risk of abduction and rape, and are often forced to marry their attackers and coerced into converting to Islam. Pakistan's notorious blasphemy laws are used to target Christians, and Islamic extremist groups vehemently 'defend' these laws, including attacking or killing those believed to have contravened them. Often these are used to target Christians after a dispute relating to work or tenancy, rather than genuine cases.

Christian churches do exist, but those that are active in outreach face severe persecution from society.
